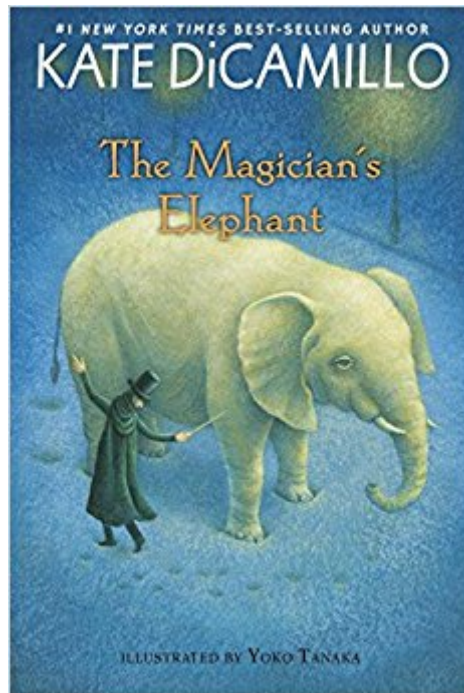

Peter learns that his fate is tied to an elephant that has inexplicably fallen from the sky when a magician's trick goes terribly wrong. Why did it happen? And, how can an elephant possibly change

there has been a war. There is a pervasive atmosphere of sorrow, want and hopelessness in the setting. Enter the orphan, Peter Augustus Duchene, a fortune teller, a magician "of failing reputation" , and an elephant. What follows is a mysterious, magical story in which hope and faith eventually triumph. The black and white illustrations are subtly evocative, and add much to the magical atmosphere of the story. I was enchanted with this story. Had I read it as a child, this would have been a five star book for me. However, I was not a typical reader. I think The Magician's Elephant would have limited appeal for the ordinary 8 to 12 year-old. It would find favor with the bright readers who have an early appreciation of good literature. With careful guidance, it might stimulate some good discussion as a read-a-loud.

Kate DiCamillo is by far one of my favorite children's authors. A preview of this book is in the end of The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane, and it had us hooked. (We've read Edward Tulane several times -- a GREAT read). The best part about all of her books is that there is a deep meaning to all of them, and they deal with tough issues like loss and the complications of family love/bonds, but when there are things like elephants magically appearing, it keeps the kids greatly interested. This book tells the tale from many different view points. I'm not sure the exact reading level, but I imagine this would be hard for an 8-9 year old to read on their own. However, it is such a great story that I recommend reading it out loud as a family anyway.

This book appeals to my fourth grade students' love for imaginative, humorous, offbeat tales. Kate DiCamillo is one of our most favorite authors.

My 5 year old can't stop giggling when I read this to her.
