

Zoe Saadia has a profound way of letting us see historical fiction at its best. She has a talent of opening up worlds long lost to us. In this book, Coytl and Kuini are constant companions. They try to live up to the expectations of their families, but when the great city of Texcoco tempts the boys, Coytl is dragged into an unexpected adventure with his Highlander friend. War is brewing and while the

companions feel themselves being drawn in, Kuini realizes that he is on both sides of the fighting, and also on none. This is very well written and as you follow the adventure, you step back in history in the time of the Aztecs. The details are amazingly accurate and the characters that you meet along the way all fit in the time-frame.

Almost a. Coming of age tale about two different boys from two different tribes. It gave some insight into how these people formed alliances with each other or tried to destroy each other. Not very different from our modern time.

Zoe Saadia sets her story in the ancient Aztec world. It was a refreshing change to read a story from a time and place most authors never venture to. The story surrounds two young men, both are sons of the leaders of their people. Their friendship is unlikely because of who they are, but it becomes stronger as the boys start to grow into men. I loved the main characters and the twists and turns of the plot. I intend to dive into the next book in the series as soon as I can.

A continuation of many of her other stories. Like the first book I read of hers, The Young Jaguar, this story was elegant and masterfully written. The descriptions just seem to come alive as I read the story. I am a devotee of mesoamerican cultures and I simply enjoy reading her books.
