

That Devil Forrest: Life Of General Nathan Bedford Forrest



Synopsis

“That devil Forrest” was at his heels again, and once more the crackling rifles of his rear-guard and their relentless pursuers came ringing through the wood. Nathan Bedford Forrest was one of twelve children, born to a poor blacksmith and his wife in Bedford County, Tennessee. Yet, despite these humble origins he would go on to become one of the most innovative cavalry leaders America has ever seen. His enemies respected him and his Southern compatriots admired him. Both General Johnston and General Sherman agreed that he was “the most remarkable man our Civil War produced on either side.” While Jefferson Davis and Robert E. Lee, in their postwar memoirs, stated that the tide of the war might have been changed had the Confederate high command better used Forrest’s talents. John A. This book was first published as *Life of General Nathan Bedford Forrest* in 1908. Wyeth died in 1922.

A semi-worshipful account of the history of one of the most successful leaders in the Civil War, written by an officer who served closely under him. The research done by the author is incredibly detailed, as he tracked down just about everyone Forrest ever fought with or against. It's a good thing the guys in Richmond never really turned him loose, or the North may have lost the War! He was an original, daring, some would even say reckless, and imaginative in a way the highly-trained officers against whom he fought never could figure out. Yes, he earned part of his fortune as a slave trader, but he would never separate families, and if he bought a married slave, he always sought out and bought the other members of the family. He would never break up a family, either. Given the conditions of the time, it says a lot for him that slaves considered it a privilege and an honor to be owned by him because of his humane treatment. Truly an interesting man! He had 28 horses shot out from under him, and was wounded many times in just about every part of his body, but he fought on. His brigade was the last Confederate unit to end the war, but they never really surrendered ...

Any consideration of N B Forrest requires one to think like a citizen of Tennessee in the 1860s--an impossible task! Clearly, a great military figure, blending initiative with bravery; clearly, a product of his times--racist and anti-federal. The author is an admirer of Forrest and is quick to defend his actions at Ft. Pillow and association with KKK. The author, too, is a product of his time. One questions Ft. Pillow and his treatment of his inferiors, but is left with no doubt as to his significant

military actions. N B Forrest is a remarkable confederate general we must admire and dislike. As one who's roots are southern Tennessee and Georgia with patriarchs who fought in "the lost cause" and later in WWI and WWII--I've seen my ancestors move from "Live and Die in Dixie" to "I have a dream" in my lifetime. Judge not the hearts of our ancestors; we fail to factor in the force behind culture.

Perhaps because he was not bound by doctrine and the acts of others, his imagination had greater latitude and he settled upon unexpected courses of action that baffled his opponents. Discussions of the impact of heat casualties, the complexities of maintaining mounted forces, and the use of terrain are all enlightening because of the paucity of attention to these subjects in more modern Civil War studies.
