

We have gone back and forth over which math curriculum we should use. I have decided on two different ones, taking a bit from each. One we chose to use was Saxon Math. But I will say that we usually only complete 1 side of the worksheets unless there is something that needs more practice. While I think repetitiveness is good in math, Saxon goes a little bit far with it and I have found my daughter gets tiresome of doing the problems over and over again if she already clearly understands them. But overall I am happy with her progress on Saxon Math, particularly with the real life application of math, as well as the sheets with addition / subtraction practice. Will see how it goes this year, but I think we will probably continue on with Saxon Math.

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
